The Blessing of the Steeples!

March 21 was a big event for us—the blessing of our church steeples and the first ringing of the bells! The church was full, as parishioners came from other parishes here in Primorye. Here is a photo of our Bishop Kirill Klimovich and the priests standing at the entrance of the church to prepare for the blessing. As a surprise, Fr Edmund Cisek, whose organization of Polish Siberians purchased the bells and brought them to us already 8 years ago flew in from Poland to be with us for the historic event. The bells have been waiting that long to be heard! The bishop also blessed the altar in the Chapel and the baptistery. Included in the event was the Sacrament of Confirmation for 15 of our adult parishioners. We wish that all of the donors to our steeple project could have been here, but everyone was in the printed program of the day.

Four of my folks didn't get their letter in time (slow post office), so they will need to be confirmed the next time the bishop will be here. The news media were here to film the event, and sure enough more people came to mass on Sunday—Even though we've been

here nearly 20 years, there are still people who don't know that there is a Catholic parish here. Now the steeples are visible, at least in daylight, and we want to illuminate them at night, when and if we can afford it.

Music – Finishing Touches

It has taken more than 100 years to complete the construction of our church. Begun in 1908, by the time it was more or less finished in 2010 it was already historic, so Fr Myron decided to complete the Mass of Blessing of the bell towers and steeples with the solemn singing of the *Te Deum Laudamus* (We Praise You, God). This is the great hymn of praise, which for more than 1500 years has been used by faithful Catholics to express their gratitude to God for favors received, work accomplished and milestones arrived at. Tradition ascribes the authorship of the original Latin text to both Saints Ambrose and Augustine on the occasion of Augustine's baptism by Ambrose in 387 AD. The text follows the outline of the Apostles' Creed, mixing a poetic vision of the heavenly liturgy with a declaration of faith. The petitions at the end of the hymn are a selection of verses from the Book of Psalms.

So that our entire parish community could participate in this important act of choral praise, rather than use the traditional Gregorian chant version in Latin we used instead a metered version in Russian sung to a simple yet powerful and uplifting melody that parishioners practiced several times in advance of the day of blessing.

In thanksgiving for the completion of the church the parish music program presented two special concert performances, on Sunday and Monday, March 21-22. Performers included the head organist of the parish Marina Omelchenko; the Vladivostok Catholic Concert Choir (27 members); the string ensemble *Regina Angelorum* (6 members); and special guest soprano soloist Veronica Kasyanova from the Khabarovsk Philharmonic. The closing organ piece, played superbly by Marina, was *Carillon de Westminster* by French composer and organist Louis Vierne. It is a fantasia based on the hourly chime pattern of the Westminster Abbey bells, which play the same four notes as our bells that pealed for the first time immediately following the blessing of the bell towers. As this masterpiece of French symphonic organ music reached its crescendo all 177 stops on our Stella Maris organ were pulled out and sounding triumphantly.

News Notes

- When the Canadian Navy came to Vladivostok by ship 15 years ago, they brought about 20 boxes of charcoal for incense at Sunday Mass. It has lasted until now! Of course you can't bring self-lighting charcoal by plane for safety reasons, so we didn't know how we would find charcoal when this ran out. Well, Fr Dan found a great solution. We can buy self-lighting charcoal here for tobacco waterpipes, and they burn clean, since the smoke is usually inhaled. So we'll be buying these to use for incense at mass from now on.
- We'd like to sit on our laurels about the church restoration after the blessing of the steeples on March 21, but we can't! We still have four projects to complete: The finishing of the small library building, the finishing of the choir room, the completion of the driveways and landscaping around the church, and the fixing of the roof of the church.

The roof was replaced some 23 years ago before we received the building back. They didn't replace the gutters and downspouts, so water just drips everywhere, and ice falls to the ground, sometimes endangering life and limb (and car windshields). The roof was done in galvanized steel, which has since started to rust and leak. What we would like to do is to replace the roof with stainless steel, and finish the guttering, but we can't afford it. Perhaps we can cover the roof with a rubber coat, which should fill the holes and extend its life for another ten years, at which time we could hopefully afford to go the metal way.

- Fifteen years ago Lena Solip and Olga Berndnikova translated the whole series of Faith and Life catechisms for grade school kids into Russian. The series was produced by Catholics United for the Faith, and published by Ignatius Press in San Francisco. We never published them here, however, because the diocese began to get interested in publishing a set of catechisms of their own. That project never materialized, so we are back to publishing our own Faith and Life series. Grades 1 and 2 are already off the press. They are especially good for parents who want to teach their own children the catechism at home, especially those who live far from parishes. Grade One is an overall introduction to the Catholic faith for children. Grade Two is specifically for preparation for First Communion. Besides the textbooks there are activity books and teacher's guides.
- The Lynch Family Foundation has helped us complete the new laundry at Children's Hospital #3. As you recall the Anya's Foundation donated the washer and centrifuge. Now we've bought the drier and flat ironer. With money we saved by asking for a discount, we also purchased a laundry cart.

How to Communicate with Us

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Special Requests

I went to the house of one of my parishioners who was abandoned by her boyfriend although she gave birth of twin boys. I found out that they do not have running water in their house. They have to go a long distance to fetch water. In the winter it is really difficult as the street is full of snow which is never plowed. She is living with two small kids and her mother who is always sick and old, and she has a younger sister with her who goes to the school.

She goes to fetch water but there is long line of people who draw water or often there is no water supply and she has to wait a long time. But how can she wait, leaving behind the children with no one to attend?

I found out that they could get the water supply connection to their house. But it will cost at least minimum 15 thousand rubles (\$520.) This includes the cost of the pipe, connection charges, and water meter, and another thousand for sink, tape, labor, and fittings. So a total of 18 thousand rubles.

It is a humble request from her, if there is any chance to get this help, she will be grateful to you and to the sponsor.

Within hours of getting this request, a donor in Pennsylvania already sent the necessary sum to our donation site on our website. God bless you!

The Women's Support Center in Lesozovodsk wrote to ask if we could find help for a little girl. She needed open heart surgery, and the government offered to provide the surgery free of charge, on March 18, but her mom would have to pay for her own stay with her daughter in the hospital, at \$30 per day, which for 30 days comes to \$900! Her dad only earns \$216 per month, and he and his wife have two other children, 8 years old, and 2 years old. They asked if we could help.

Naturally I thought that a lot of people would like to help, and I just sent an e-mail to some folks, and sure enough, we had the whole sum ready for her when she left for the airport to fly to Novosibirsk for the operation. Thanks, folks! Now we are waiting to hear the results.

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Two sisters came from a village to Vladivostok to study. These inexperienced girls soon got involved with some young men students, and found out that they were pregnant. All were exasperated about what to do—they live in the dormitory, and they have very little means of support. Should they give birth, or is abortion the answer? One sister came to the Women's Support Center for help.

Our volunteer spoke to her, and gave the same advice as her boyfriend: Give birth! In the course of it all, the second sister got acquainted with the boyfriend's roommate, and fell in love. Two boys were born in January and February. Now both couples are married and together take care of their children. In fact, it has been fun for the volunteer that the guys come to the Center, too, which is a rarity. God bless them! They have felt real fatherhood!
