Groundbreaking for the New Church in Nakhodka

Bishop Cyril Klimovich blessed the site and then dug the first shovelful on November 17. Thank you, benefactors, who are contributing to the construction of the church! As a parishioner said at the event, "We have been waiting 20 years for this day!"

An Amazing Gift

The New Diego Cera Pipe Organ, Opus 25

On November 15, when our Bishop Kirill Klimovich visited our parish for the sacrament of Confirmation, he also blessed our new pipe organ, which was installed in May, June and July. We waited until November so that Bishop Kirill could do the blessing and also attend one of the four inaugural concerts. Ours is the first pipe organ in the Russian Far East which has traditional mechanical action between the keys and the pipe valves, so it was a historic event for the parish and for the entire city.

To help celebrate it we invited four organists to play at the inaugural concerts: Marina Omelchenko, formerly of our parish, who is now the chief (*Continued on Page 2*) (Continued from Page 1, column 1) At three o'clock, he concelebrated Holy Mass in our parish chapel. Some of our guest priests who came to join in our celebration and joy are, Fr Myron Effing, along with some seminarians, sisters and parishioners from Vladivostok Parish. Fr John Gibson along with Bro Stephanus and sisters from Ussurysk parish and Fr Christopher from the Romanovka parish. During the Holy Mass, our Bishop Kirill specially prayed for the new small church where we can easily come together for prayer. He also made a point to thank all the people who love our small church community, and especially through financially contributions for the construction of the church.

6. Repair of the way our **bells are hung** in the steeples in Vladivostok.

(*Continued from Page 1, column 2*) organist at the Catholic Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception in Moscow; our own Sr Maria Stella, C.J.D., who received her bachelor and master's degrees in organ performance from Emery University, Atlanta, GA; and two special guests: Dr Jennifer Pascual, Director of Music at Saint Patrick's Cathedral, NYC, and Fr Johann Trummer of Graz, Austria, a major benefactor of the new organ. Unfortunately Fr Trummer had to postpone his trip.

The musical program of the concerts was chosen to showcase how the new organ sounds when playing a wide range of liturgical and sacred music, duets with other instruments and also accompanying a choir. The first concert, free of charge for all parishioners, was packed and the other three concerts were all sold out in advance, for a total attendance of over 1100 people.



In addition to the guest organists, we were privileged to have with us for the occassion the master builder of the organ from the Philippines, Mr. Cealwyn Tagle. On Saturday evening before the first two concerts Cealwyn finetuned all the 986 pipes on the organ, giving special attention to the highly

sensitive reed pipes played on the lower keyboard and the pedals.

Press coverage of the blessing and inaugural concerts was extensive, including Sr Tatiana Avdokushina, MSC director of the KANA Catholic Television Studio in Novosibirsk, Russia, which covers major Catholic news in Russia. She recorded two concerts and interviewed all the organists, parish staff, organ builder Cealwyn Tagle and also myself as the parish director of music programs. Four local TV stations, two radio stations and three newspapers also covered the events.

Long-time *Sunrise* readers may remember that our parish has had several organs since it was re-established in 1992, the year that we priests returned to the parish to stay. Three months after arriving, we purchased a small electric Casio tabletop keyboard with only 3 organ voices to begin the parish choir. Two years later we upgraded to a Technics keyboard with 6 organ voices.

With the return of the historic Catholic church to the parish in 1994, we were given the gift of a large, vintage (1973) Rodgers analog electronic organ by the Epiphany of the Our Lord Parish in Coon Rapids, MN. Besides liturgical use, we began our successful organ concert program with it. From 2003 until 2015 we have been using the large, digital electronic *Stella Maris* organ (Rodgers Trillium 927 (170 stops) donated by members of Stella Maris Parish, Sullivan's Island, SC. Since 2008 we also have had the "Saint Ambrose Pipes" (7 stops, with

electro-magnetic action), which are played from the Stella Maris organ console together with the digital electronic stops.

Why did we get a new pipe organ when we already had a large digital electronic organ and even a small set of real pipes for it? Since we arrived in Russia in February 1992 our parish has become a leader in the development of Roman Catholic liturgical music in Russia. A mechanical-action pipe organ is the best kind of organ to continue to develope our liturgical music program. And it was an amazing gift!

In 2004 we had the good fortune to meet Fr Johann Trummer, the founder of the Musical University in Graz, Austria. Before we met him he had started an annual summer seminar in Moscow to help teach the organ to Catholic parish musicians in Russia. Our parish organist Marina Omelchenko had met Fr Trummer in Moscow, where she first participated in his summer liturgical music seminars in 2003. When Fr Trummer learned that Vladivostok had become a center for Catholic liturgical music development he wanted to come to Vladivostok to see our work. On his first trip here in 2008 he told us that if we really wanted to make progress in the development of liturgical music and especially organ music, we would need a traditional MECHANICAL-ACTION pipe organ for musicians to learn how to play the organ well.



Fr Trummer thinks that electronic organs, and even pipe organs with electric action (electro-magnetic connections between the keys and the valves that open and close the air channels to the pipes) do not help musicians to become excellent organists. A mechanical action pipe organ is required so that an organist can feel in his fingers the opening of the

valves rather than using electric action with which the exact moment of contact cannot be felt. All the moving parts of the Diego Cera, Opus 25, except for the air compressor are mechanical, just as they were in all organs from the time the organ was invented in Egypt before the birth of Christ until the harnessing of electricity in the last half of the 19th century. Our mechanical-action organ has over 13,000 moving parts, all made by hand!

In 1994 Fr Trummer helped to found a pipe organ company in the Philippines, the Diego Cera Organbuilders. As a first step he sent two young Filipino students to Europe to learn all the skills necessary to become a true master organ builder. Cealwyn Tagle of the Catholic Parish of Saint Joseph in Las Piñas near Manila was one of them. He is now the president of the company. He says that their main goal is to build medium sized mechanical-action pipe organs that are financially accessible to normal size parishes. He explains that a real pipe organ positively affects the kind of liturgical music that parish organists choose to play. It is much different than the sounds from the ubiquitous table top keyboards, most of which have rhythm automatic, percussion sounds (drums, whistles, etc.) and highly romanticized and artificial sounding strings, horns and other gadgets that change the tradition of Roman Catholic liturgical organ music for the worse. And Diego Cera organs are much less expensive than other brands of pipe organs. A new pipe organ made in Europe of the same size and quality as our Diego Cera organ would cost 4 to 5 times more than ours. When we learned that Fr Trummer wanted to donate to us over one-third of the total cost of the organ, we agreed in principle to proceed with the project. Another one-third of the cost was donated by Vladivostok

parishioners, and the last third by special benefactors in the USA.

With advice from Fr Trummer and in consultation with us, Cealwyn designed every detail of the Diego Cera organ for our church. He measured the acoustical characteristics of the church interior; photographed the exterior of the church building and the reredos in order to incorporate some of their design elements into the design of the organ case.

The organ's 986 pipes comprise three divisions (great, positif and pedal) with 17 stops, enough for the liturgical and concert needs of the parish but not too much that it would make the organ too loud in volume, nor so large that it would obscure any stained glass windows.

17 stops is much smaller than the 170 stops of the *Stella Maris* Rodgers Trillium 927, which is now located upstairs in the choir loft; but 17 are enough to be able to play 95% of all organ music that has every been written. Our organ is ideally designed to play baroque and classical organ music and to accompany choirs and congregational singing during Mass and other liturgical services.

With the acquisition of the Diego Cera Opus 25 our parish music program has taken another huge step. We think we will be able to increase the number of concerts of sacred music from 4 programs of 10 concerts to around 8 or 9 programs of 20 concerts annually, making this program an even more effective way to reach people with the Good News of Jesus Christ through sacred music. It is also the perfect instrument to accompany the canonical Liturgy of the Hours and expand it to include more parishioners.

He is a son of Nativity Parish in Ussurysk which Fr Myron founded in the jubilee year 2000 which is currently being served by Franciscans. Fr Vitaly celebrated his First Mass in Ussurysk on October 24 with representatives

of all the parishes in Primorye present. He is the second priest to be ordained from the native Catholics of our state since the reopening of parishes. He is being assigned by his superiors to work in Almaty, Kazakhstan.

So Fr Sebastian will look after two parishes beginning February 14th, while he is also building the new church in Nakhodka.
