# Ordination Days for the C.J.D.

It was January 12 when the whole village of Nele, and lots of others from Maumere and friends and relatives of the ordinands came out to meet Bishop Kherubim and the deacons to be ordained to the priesthood. It was the grand parade from the edge of the village to the parish church, and all the street fronts were decorated to greet the bishop. He was met by police who stopped all traffic, by villagers





in their best traditional native costumes, and by troops of native dancers in brilliant costumes. The tribal leader was on hand to give a welcoming speech, and fire crackers were crackling. The parade must have taken 30 minutes, just a hint of the 3.5 hour ceremony to follow.

The parish ushered us into the rectory for a drink of water and some lunch, and so we clergy could all vest. Meanwhile the laity entered the huge church with its back-less pews and open-to-the-air window frames, and its strangely pink colored walls. The choir had been collected from several parishes and had long practiced for this special day—the priestly ordination of one of their own parishioners, our Bro Yohanes Marinus, and of our Bro Jacob who had served as deacons already for a year. It was to be a no-holds-barred day of celebration!







After the Ordination Mass, there were the usual speeches and thank you's, and then a huge procession with brightly colored native costumes to the rectory, again for water and a little lunch. (The offer of a glass of clean, clear water is the first element of hospitality in this hot and humid climate.)

When the lunch was over, the whole parish was invited to an amazing dinner, complete with entertainment and many kinds of fruit drinks. I said, "But we just ate!" No matter-This is a special day for the whole parish and the whole church!

#### Preaching at a Kasaulogan sa Pulong

Kasaulogan sa Pulong in English literally means "Celebration of the Word" which can be equated to "Liturgy of the Word" which is normally experienced in the Philippines in some remote area chapels which are administered by a religious brother or laymen where the faithful can listen to the Gospel readings followed by a reflection and sharing and receive Communion in the absence of a priest. I joined my former Cebuano classmates for this experience in December 17 to 24.

Kasaulogan sa Pulong was not without its challenges. First of all, it requires inner preparation. I always believed that a good preacher always preaches, but uses only words when necessary, in which people get attracted to the words only if the preacher becomes an instrument to them by the sincerity of heart. I remember once I used to say this line to someone I knew who was good at words, "excuse me, your actions are too loud that I cannot hear what you just said." Now I am in the position of convincing people not just by words but also in deeds. The solemn act of bringing the Sacred Scriptures to the people and interpreting its words to enlighten the faithful requires the sincerest of efforts. How could it not be, since it would not just be their life in the Church at stake, but also their relationship with God? Thus, I prepared myself by intense study and praying for enlightenment that I may be able to effectively get the message and lesson of God across to the people. The thought of failing that burdened me, but because it was not just failing the people but also the community and God. That very thought strengthened my resolve.

Second, *Kasaulogan sa Pulong* requires outer preparation. The place where we were to hold the event was a far-flung place. It has been quite a time since I last rode a *habal-habal*, the quickest way of transportation available to our modest budget, save for walking. Add to that the poor state of the roads, which required intense balancing and quick reflexes on the part of the driver. Not only that, but we must travel in the dawn, long before the sun has risen. The cold air of the dawn is amplified by the rain and the accompanying winds. And so, I steeled myself for the exhausting journey ahead, that I may not be a whiner, which I find to be inappropriate for someone with such an important task ahead. Besides, whining would not be conducive to a sincere sharing of God's word with the people.

My inner and outer preparations served me well in the course of Kasaulogan sa Pulong. Not only did I manage to convey what I discerned is the message of God, but also it led me to some considerations of my own, like how the people maintain the faith, even with the scarcity of community events that urban dwellers enjoy year round. It goes to show what kind of Christians are in the far-flung community where we did the Kasaulogan sa Pulong, that they went to an event not led by priests at a time when most of us are still sleeping soundly. These Christians knew the value of the *pulong* and the importance of its correct understanding. Without them, the event would not have been successful. The second consideration is on how good preachers are needed more than ever. In our society in which sources of temptations are growing, the Christian message must be sent across. But today, when people are more persuaded by the sensational rather than the rational, good preaching does not mean simply reiterating what the Church teaches but to form these teachings so as to resonate with the people. Kasaulogan sa Pulong gives future preachers an opportunity to learn what resonates with the people, since only exposure can form such mindset.

Despite the elements of nature arrayed against me, I accomplished my assignment. The hardships that I faced melted away in the memory of that successful *Kasaulogan sa Pulong*, where there was an equal exchange: the people from me, and I from the people.

## The 19th Annual Christmas Festival of Christian Choirs

The 19th annual Christmas Festival of Christian Choirs took place in our church in Vladivostok on the second Sunday in January at 4:00 PM. The festival was founded by our parish for the Christmas season of 1998 (January 1999).

This year the participating choirs increased to 7 from 5 different denominations: 1. our own Catholic Mass choir (11 members); 2. a four-person vocal ensemble from the Evangelical Lutheran Parish of St. Paul; 3. the Eastern Presbyterian Church choir (also11 members); 4. the Methodist Church adult choir (only 4 members participated because others were sick with winter colds); 5. new to the festival this year was the same Methodist parish's children's choir (8 members); 6. the Central Baptist Church choir (the largest choir participating this year, with 21 members and a new choir director); 7. the *Stella Maris* Musical Ensemble and Choir (18 members), which was founded by our former parish organist, Elvira Gribanova, and which has an interdenominational membership of Catholics, Orthodox and Protestants, including three children from the music school

where Elvira works. The children sang without music notes or words, having learned their two Christmas songs perfectly by heart.

Also participating in the first part of the festival and receiving very warm rounds of applause were some of the members of our religious communities: Our three American canonesses of the Sisters in Jesus the Lord – Sr Maria Stella, Sr Catherine Marie and Sr Faustina - playing two Christmas songs on harp and flutes;

Three of our novice Canons of Jesus the Lord, two from Indonesia and one from India: Br Alberten sang an *a cappela* solo rendition of "Silent Night" in Indonesia; and Br Desideratus accompanied by Br Pradeep on electronic keyboard sang in Indonesian: "God So Loved the World that He Gave Us His Only-begotten Son".

The second part of the festival is when all participants gather together on risers in the sanctuary of our church to form the Collected Christian Choir of Vladivostok. This year we sang 8 Christmas carols in Russian, two of which were new to the collected choir and six which are among our favorites that we have often sung at past festivals, and among which were: "O Holy Night", "Silent Night", "It Came Upon a Midnight Clear", and the finale each year "Joy to the World".

With the increase in choirs this year we also had an increase in audience. Practically all the 260 seats in our church were taken. Next January for the 20th Annual Festival we hope to have even more. Russians love "round



numbers". The Christmas Festival of Choirs is one of the most joyous of all of our many music programs each year.

- Brother Patrick Napal, C.J.D., is on his Pastoral Year from his seminary in Davao, Philippines. His year is being taken in Yerevan, Armenia, where he is following up his interest in the Armenian Catholic Rite. He first lived and helped the Mother Theresa sisters and their home for severely handicapped children. He was able to be of considerable help to the sisters and the children, including doing all their Christmas decorating. We'd like to show you pictures, but perhaps the parents of the children would object. He also has been helping the Catholic bishops of Armenia, and says he is starting to do well in the Armenian language (his 7<sup>th</sup> language besides Latin and Greek.) It is interesting to note that Armenia was the first officially Christian country in the world, and its church goes back to apostolic times. There are many Armenians in Vladivostok but their parish is without a priest, and many in Russia in general, so his knowledge should be useful in the future.
- While I was in Maumere, Indonesia, I took the opportunity to bless the as-yet incomplete **social building** at Our Lady of Vladivostok Seminary on January 15. For now, we are only building the first floor, which contains the kitchen and dining room. The 2<sup>nd</sup> floor can be done later when the need is greater; it will contain study areas, meeting space, and a lounge. None-the-less, the seminarians set up the first floor for our Mass of Blessing. I spoke about how the monastic dining room is already a symbol of the messianic banquet that we shall all see in heaven. Meanwhile plans are completed for the new chapel building next door, and the beginnings of the foundation for it are in place.
