# The Women's Support Centers

Here in Russia there has always been the great need to help women in crisis pregnancy situations and with other problems. Because of the history of serfdom, like slavery in America, and because of World War II when millions of Russian men were killed. Russia has become a

matriarchal society at the family level, with rampant abortion and divorce rates and few men at home. But Russia is a patriarchy at the national level, so there is very little understanding of the problems of women from the government side. Add to this the 70-year lack of religious and moral teaching which also took a toll. Soon our six crisis pregnancy centers will celebrate their 2500<sup>th</sup> saved baby, and 20 years of excellent work with women and men, boys and girls. So we are dedicating this issue of the *Sunrise* to the Women's Support Centers of our state of Primorye. Packed with this *Sunrise* is a brochure giving more details about the Centers, and asking your prayers and financial support.

### From the Women's Support Centers

Recently a 15 year old girl came to us and asked for help for her child. She told us her story. When she was 14 years old she was raped by a 38 year old man. When she became pregnant she didn't do an abortion because her doctors recommended against it. As a result she gave birth to a healthy baby girl, and the court gave the man only a suspended sentence! She loves her daughter and takes good care of her, but she doesn't have the monetary means to care for the child. Our Center is providing her help

# The 2017 Young Adult Conference in Ussurysk: God's Forgiveness across the World

In August we held the 21st. annual Far Eastern Catholic Youth Conference at the Franciscan Monastery in Ussurysk, as part of the FOCUS team's mission trip to Russia. Our theme for the week was "Forgiveness" and each of our speakers had a unique approach. Sister Maria Anastasia, a Ukrainian from the Society of the Incarnate Word, even gave a talk on Fatima and what the Blessed Virgin had said then, a perfect way to tie in the 100-year-old miracle with our conference theme.

On a Monday afternoon, we all gathered into the conference room on the upper floor for opening ceremonies and introductions. Someone suggested we play the "name game" as a way of getting to know one another; we had to go around the room and say everyone's name up to ourselves until everyone had spoken up. Within only a few minutes, we realized that people were here not just from Russia and America but from many other countries around the world. Our final "country count" was 15, with our three main languages being Russian, English and Spanish: USA, Russia, Poland, Armenia, Ukraine, Argentina Columbia, Spain, India, Korea, Pakistan, Peru, Brazil, Vietnam, and The Philippines.

Later in the evening, after dinner, we gathered back in the conference room for another game—"musical chairs"! We had to make it a rule that you couldn't run until after both languages had been given, but in spite of whatever minor problems that came up, it was a great time for everyone—the high point of most people's day as we found out later—and a wonderful way to break down all of the language and other barriers--we had lay and

religious, young and old, introverted and extroverted all running around together.

Throughout the week, we listened to different talks in the conference room every morning after breakfast. Following the talks we broke into six different small groups, in our three main languages. We were allowed to pick which group we wanted to be part of, depending on how fluently we spoke the language. Every morning we prayed morning prayer together in the tiny chapel on the second floor, strategically alternating Russian and English. Whenever some of the Incarnate Word sisters and I sat close together, we would share the same Liturgy of the Hours book. Every afternoon, we celebrated Mass together and every evening, we prayed Evening Prayer. Our last "spiritual gathering" of the day would be adoration. The first night of the conference, the lights all across the city went out and, as many of the participants pointed out, it made it impossible not to focus on God as He stood there in the monstrance, the candlelight gleaming on the gold fixture. We had four different priests—one American, one Polish, one from Argentina and one from Colombia—and they all took turns alternating as the main celebrants.

We had lots of fun too. We split into two large groups, a liturgy group and a theater group. The liturgy group, a choir, prepared songs to sing at different masses throughout the week, and at the talent show on Saturday night. The theater group prepared a short play, a performance which preceded the talent show. These performances, the talent show especially, broke down once more all of the language barriers. It didn't matter that we couldn't understand every word of every song, poem or skit; we could still feel the emotions and see the expressions on peoples' faces.

On Thursday, we took the train to a small village called Terehovka to spend the day at Vladimir and Faina's dacha; Vladimir and Faina, like so many Russians, were some of the most joyful, welcoming, and generous people we had met. At their dacha, we had our usual talk, celebrated mass with five priests in the living room, and ate delicious food. In the afternoon, we went to a lake, prayed a rosary on the walk back, and then spent a very exuberant thirty minutes or more singing

joyful songs together in our three languages before heading back to Ussurysk. And all of this happened the day before we went on silent retreat, except for praying and singing, a spiritually fulfilling experience for those who had never done it before.

But the most fun of all were the dances that the Russians and Fr Cyprian taught us. It was on Saturday before the performances and talent show. With the speakers of someone's car blasting a lively song at full volume, we all gathered outside in front of the monastery so that we could learn the dances together. By the time we got done just practicing the dance together, we were all laughing and out of breath but ready to dance again. The icing on the cake was that the customers at the cafe on the property were watching all of us!

It was a very happy, spiritually productive, and fulfilling week for all of us. During testimony time on Saturday and Sunday, everyone said something along the lines of, "Thank you!" and "I will never forget you all!" We are all waiting with joy to see what next year's conference will be like. Maybe we will have just as many countries as we did this year!

### **Winter Dates in History**

**January 1, 1994** The church building was returned to the Parish of the Most Holy Mother of God by the state legislature.

**January 5, 1933** Death of our Bishop Karl Slivovsky, D.D. from natural causes.

**January 11, 1890** Russian Holy Synod moved the Catholic center of the Russian Far East from Nicolaevsk-na-Amure to Vladivostok.

**February 2 1902** The first Catholic church in Vladivostok burned down at night.

**February 2, 1923** Papal bull establishing the Diocese of Vladivostok.

**February 3, 1937** Five parishioners were shot by the KGB, having been accused of counterrevolutionary religious and political activities: Anton Gerasimuk, Valery Gerasimuk, Sigismund Brzhesinsky, Jan Strudzinski, and Martin Malinevsky.

**February 13, 1992** Pastor Fr Myron Effing, C.J.D. and Deacon Daniel Maurer, C.J.D. arrive.

**February 18, 1866** Emperor Alexander II erected the first Catholic parish and appointed the first Catholic priest for the Russian Far East, Ss Peter and Paul Parish in Nicolaevsk-na-Amure and pastor Fr Kazimir Radzishevsky.

**February 18, 1923** The Vladivostok Minor Seminary was closed by Soviet authorities.

• In early December our church of the Most Holy Mother of God in Vladivostok had the honor of being chosen by Polish government and cultural leaders to host the first in a series of special events in preparation for the 100th Anniversary of the Liberation of Poland in 1918.

With the first "Partition of Poland" in 1772, the country of Poland ceased to exist and was wiped off the map. Some of the occupying countries even tried to wipe out the Polish language. Polish independence was only regained in the devastation after

World War I (1914-1918).

Before the persecution and total suppression of the Catholic Church by the Communist Party in Russia (1917-1991), our Far Eastern parish, numbered more than 15,000 members before it was closed, most of whom were Polish. An integral part of parish life was the Polish Cultural Association centered in the parish. All the clergy of the parish were Polish. Many of our families had been citizens of the Russian Empire for over 150 years (5-6 generations).

General Consul Kshishtov (Christopher) Sviderek of the Polish Consulate in Irkutsk knows well the Polish history of our parish. He visited us here in Vladivostok in late October to plan the first preparatory event for the 100th anniversary year.

It was decided to organize two special events in our parish: an evening organ concert by the most famous living Polish concert organist, Prof. Marek Stefanski of the Krakow Music Conservatory, featuring baroque and modern organ music mostly by Polish composers; and a Christmas "Vigilia" dinner with the typical Polish custom of breaking and sharing the Christmas bread called "oblatki" and with homemade pre-Christmas dishes keeping the custom of abstaining from meat until after Christmas Midnight Mass.


The concert on Saturday evening, Dec. 9, was a huge success, with all 250 tickets sold out well in advance.

After the concert, Prof. Stefanski said that he fell in love with the beautiful sound and responsive touch of our Diego Cera Opus 25 pipe organ, insisting that it is a very rare, high-quality instrument.

On Dec. 10, the "Vigilia" dinner was a wonderful occasion, held as a group event in Vladivostok probably for the first time in 87 years, after all parish buildings were closed and confiscated in 1930.

• Construction Projects in Indonesia continue, including three projects at the moment: A chapel building, an enlarged dormitory for seminarians, and a grotto to the Blessed Virgin. The grotto is being funded by friends in Indonesia, and it is expected to become something of a pilgrimage site. There are already people who come there to pray to the Blessed Virgin. The grotto is designed to be added to as Indonesians donate for that purpose.

Mass can already be celebrated at the outdoor grotto.

The kitchen and dining building is designed as a multiuse building, and the roof against the rainy season has already been installed higher up so that walls can be added for seminarians' rooms and bathrooms on the second floor. A stairway is already in place.

The project also underway is the Our Lady of Vladivostok Chapel. The foundation has already been laid, and it is hoped that the building will be done by June to replace the present temporary chapel on the porch of the temporary dormitory building. The chapel is being fully funded by the Papal Foundation.

- St John the Evangelist Student Center, Russian Island, Russia. The Sisters in Jesus the Lord and Most Holy Mother of God Catholic Parish have been working to open a Catholic student center near the Far Eastern Federal University on Russian Island, part of Vladivostok. The Center will be on the first floor of the sister's convent building, and, according to Russian law, must be an official parish, to be named St John the Evangelist Catholic Parish. To prepare the space for meetings, lessons, and social events, we need to do the following:
  - 1. Remove interior non-supporting walls
  - 2. Repair the walls
  - 3. Create new restrooms
  - 4. Retile the entrance area
  - 5. New floor
  - 6. New doors throughout
  - 7. 5 New windows and frames
  - 8. Install radiators for heat
  - 9. New lighting fixtures
  - 10. Simple seating

Expected costs are: Windows \$1396 Materials \$4832 Labor \$2060 Seating \$900

Total Expected Cost: \$9188
