Keeping Alive the Memory

Twenty Five years ago a simple memorial was made for simple people who were simply destroyed. The years of the late 1930's in the U.S.S.R. are known as the years of the Great Terror. It was then that they shot 1600 people per day, or more than one person per minute, day and night. It was a time of mindless fear when morals, mercy, love, and faith were forced out of the people. It was an attempt to destroy whole classes of people, parts of society, who were considered enemies of the revolutionary dictatorship. The victims were of various nationalities and various religions. The wave of cruelty reached to Vladivostok, including the Catholic parish and the local Polish community. The "national operation" took place in the 1937's– 1938's, when the Great Terror targeted whole Polish families. The exact number of those condemned, executed, and buried is still unknown. The places of the burials were secret for decades. The victims were not only deprived of life, but even deprived of a grave and a memorial stone, a final violation of their human dignity.

One of the places of mass burial in Vladivostok was found in the region of the Sedanka watershed. Here in the 1930's there was a wooded area where the KGB shot and killed the victims. You could call the area a "land of the dead." To discover those places of burial, those common graves, is to attempt a reparation, a humanitarian act opposing those executioners. In 1992 members of the historical research organization "Memorial," discovered the location of some mass graves of those who were shot. On that site in August of 1992 a memorial marker was created in the wooded vale between Forts 5 and 6 of the prerevolutionary Vladivostok fortifications. The site was blessed, and since then the children and grandchildren of those who were executed have held memorial services, have brought flowers and candles, and even pilgrimage groups have honored the spot.

In 2009 a new express federal highway connecting the village of DeFrieze with Russian Island was begun. The bulldozers got so close to the memorial area that it became necessary for the road crews to make some changes. It was a nightmare when they began to uproot a horde of human remains. So work on that part of the road was halted and the area was roped off. From May to June of 2010 the remains were exhumed. There were so many that it required the help of volunteers from students of the universities of Vladivostok, workers from the military police, plane crash experts, help from the city administration and from Special Services Forces.

From the place where they dug for the highway they found nearly 4 tons of bones, 495 sculls with signs of violent death from 9mm caliber guns. Experts from the Primorsky Krai Bureau of Criminal Medicine confirmed that the remains belonged to political victims. Historians consider that the number of people buried there is probably quite a bit larger than those already discovered, and would probably amount to several thousand persons. But the area uncovered so far is only about 200 yards by 150 yards. Together with the bones were found other items: purses with coins of the 1930's, cigarette holders, tobacco pipes, children's beads, drinking glasses, porcelain plates, and eyeglasses. One of the cigarette holders had the name "Andreev A." scratched into it.

Specialists are of the opinion that this place near the fort road is where those who were political prisoners and those arrested without trial or even investigations were shot. Whole families, sometimes in good civilian clothing and a minimum of personal belongings were taken from their homes, moved to the site, and forced to dig their own graves. Then they were told to kneel at the edge and lower their heads. The command "Fire!" quickly did its work. Who were these folks, without names, without even numbers?

In November of 2010 the exhumed remains were reburied in the northern part of the 14th Kilometer Cemetery in Vladivostok in 56 common graves. Members of the Memorial Society, World War II veterans, public organizations, military personnel, clergymen, and city citizens took part in the reburial ceremony. A large monument was erected on the site in 2013. On the inclined grave stone is a tablet which reads, "To the Unknown Victims of the Cruelty of 1937. Here lies the remains of 5000 persons found during construction of the highway from Sedanka to Patrokol in 2010."

How many such mass grave sites are to found yet around Vladivostok? In all of Russia only about 100 places are known to be mass grave sites. It seems too few.

Our original monument to the repressed still stands near the fort road. In these 25 years since it was erected it has sorely suffered: The roadbuilders moved it, the metal inscription plate with words was vandalized by shotgun and then stolen, a crack appeared in the base, and the cross on top was damaged. So we needed to restore it. The initiative was taken by the Catholic Parish of Vladivostok and members of "Memorial." The funeral company "Our Memory" repaired the marker.

On May 19 we cleaned up and arranged the territory around the monument and we planted flowers and decorative bushes and trees. Fr Myron and Fr Daniel, parishioners, and members of "Memorial" prayed for those who were killed in this place for political or religious reasons, including those who left this world without a trace.

"We pray for those whose earthly remains are in this place, for their families and relatives, for their descendants who never knew them." It is difficult to understand how this mass murder took place in the modern world, in our country. "Most of all, we pray that this unjust repression will never be repeated in this land. O Lord, if we must sometime suffer such as they did, give us strength to always hope in your constant help."

And for these who suffered unjustly, let there always be a candle to remember them, **until You come!**

He was ordained on Sunday, the Feast of Our Lady of Fatima in the Cathedral of Our Lady of Fatima by Bishop Odelio Dell'Oro, D.D. He was received and incardinated into the Apostolic Administration of Atyrau. The Apostolic Administrator asked me to send more vocations to him, as there is a great need for priests in Western Kazakhstan.

Brother Patrick is from Davao, Philippines. He has remarkable language talents, but is especially known for his kind heart for the poor. At his ordination he told about how he always went out at 10pm at night because it is a time when the restaurants close and they dump excess

The diocese of Las Vegas once again received gifts from the Vatican after 17 years: a ring, a miter and a crozier. These gifts were handed over to Bishop George Leo Thomas (67) as he takes over the diocese of Las Vegas at the installation ceremony on May 15. These gifts were to symbolize his new assignment: **a ring**representing fidelity to the diocese of Las Vegas and the Catholic Church, **a miter**- his association to the office of bishop and the Roman Pontiff, and a **crozier**- as a reminder of Jesus' command to shepherd the flock of the Diocese of Vegas.

Reading the appointment letter from Pope Francis, Archbishop Christophe Pierre, the Holy Father's Nuncio to the United States along with the Archbishop of San Francisco Salvatore J. Cordileone, installed Bishop Thomas as the 3rd Bishop of Las Vegas. More than 2,000 faithful of the diocese, several bishops, cardinals, priests, deacons, religious, public officials and representatives of ecumenical groups witnessed the ceremony at the Shrine of the Most Holy Redeemer, Las Vegas.

The congregation present at the celebration expressed sincere gratitude to Bishop Emeritus Joseph Pepe with non-stop applause, while whistling and cheers for minutes.

Bishop Thomas urged the priests, deacons and religious saying, "Know what we do not know." Throughout the Eucharistic celebration he emphasized a 'call to holiness' and a 'sound and substantial faith formation' in the diocese. He also said that we cannot be silent about human suffering, either in the womb or at the

death bed' so there should be a theological connection between the liturgy and our compassion. An option for the poor should be a priority in our service. Our church must be a home of mercy. We should provide a healing touch of divine mercy because mercy is the doorway to freedom, peace and harmony. With this mode of evangelization we can impact the modern world. We become missionaries to our own families first and then to the world. We should start by bringing back the missing members of our family to the family dining table. And then practice a deeper daily communion with the local church and then greater attempts at ecumenical reunion.

I was privileged to witness two installation ceremonies in the states. The first was on March 15, the installation of the Bishop of Stockton Myron Cotta, and then on May 15th, the bishop of Las Vegas George Leo Thomas. These two dioceses are very important for the CJD community, because the Mission Office is in the diocese of Stockton and CJD fathers are incardinated in the diocese of Las Vegas. Let us pray for the authorities of the Church until we are united with the Father where we will have eternal life.

A 15 year old girl came to us and asked for help for her child. She told us her story. When she was 14 years old she was raped by a 38 year old man. When she became pregnant she didn't do an abortion because her doctors recommended against it. As a result she gave birth to a healthy baby girl, and the court gave the man only a suspended sentence!
