Ordination of Bro Nikita Kushnaryov By V Rev Myron Effing, C.J.D.

Our big excitement was Sunday August 19 when Bishop Kirill was here to **ordain our brother** and parishioner Nikita Kushnaryov, C.J.D. to the diaconate! It was a big event for both Bro Nikita and for Bishop Kirill, because it was the first ordination that Bishop Kirill was able to perform in his 19 years as a bishop, because he had been an auxiliary bishop for several years. Here is a picture of the "golden moment" for you. As I tell the brothers, you don't know if you have a vocation until the hands are on your head, and after that you have no excuse to doubt! After the Ordination Mass, the parish served dinner out-of-doors to celebrate the event.

Deacon Nikita is from Rostov-na-Danu in the south of European Russia, and completed his seminary training in Poland in Polish. He completed his novitiate here in Vladivostok, and then taught the RCIA classes here to prepare people for baptism and confirmation. He also provided an ongoing education program for Catholic students of the Far Eastern Federal University where there are about 200 Catholic students, and for parish university students. He also worked on the committees for the Far Eastern Catholic Youth Conferences in 2017 and 2018.

Deacon Nikita will continue to live and work with us here in Vladivostok, taking charge of the RCIA program, as well as continuing in the university student program. Naturally he will also be helping with Sunday and Feastday masses, especially with preaching. He also enjoys garden work, making sauerkraut, and preparing mushrooms. He is our

A pregnant girl came to us for help; she was from an orphanage. Her father was in prison for drug abuse; her mother froze to death while drunk. When she graduated from the orphanage she didn't receive an apartment from the government because none were available. Now, pregnant, she had nowhere to live. Our volunteer brought the girl to her home as a temporary measure while we helped her to appeal to the local legislative deputy for help. When the girl gave birth to a healthy baby girl they gave her a room in a dormitory. Our volunteer continued to mentor her how to be a mother, how to diaper the baby, how to dress and feed her, and took care of the baby when mom needed time for rest or business. Now the "baby" goes to kindergarten and mom goes to work. And our volunteer is like mama and grandma to the little family.

Annual Catholic Youth Conference of the Russian Far East

29 July to 5 August 2018

The Conference was held at Immaculate Conception Parish in Khabarovsk. There were Russian boys and girls, as well as people from other countries who took part, including America, Indonesia, Pakistan, Brazil and Spain.

The theme of the week was "Prayer". After lunch each day, one of the missionaries from the FOCUS team gave a talk divine reading (*lectio divina*). It is a discipline that intuitively and effectively dwells on a biblical text as a means of seeking communion with Christ, so as to grow in faith, hope and charity it is based on Bible teaching. There are five main points about Divine Reading.

1. **Read**: It begins with the reading of a text, which leads to a desire to understand its true content. In other words, reading and listening to the Word of God.

2. Acknowledge: The second stage is where we think about the text we have chosen and ruminate upon it so that we take from it what God wants to give us.

3. **Relate**: it is to relate the text to my own life, how it helps me to understand my weaknesses, and how to overcome on them.

4. **Receive**: What does the biblical text say to us? Here, each person, individually but also as a member of the community, must let himself or herself be moved and challenged.

5. **Respond**: We leave our thinking aside and simply let our hearts speak to God. This response is inspired by our reflection on the Word of God.

After the opening session we were divided into five groups for divine reading each group was given the passage from John 1:1-7 to reflect on according to the points which were given in the session. Almost all the group members shared their valuable comments on that passage.

On the second day we had Morning Prayer. After breakfast Br Nikita Kushnarev CJD gave the talk on the **parts of the Holy Mass**. The Catholic Church believes that the Mass is exactly the same sacrifice that Jesus Christ offered on the Cross at Calvary. In the beginning he gave a brief introduction how mass is important in Christian life. He quoted the famous sentence of *Sacrosanctum Concillium* of Vatican II, "Liturgy is the source and summit of our life". Liturgy is the work of the church. It is not only the work or production of the priest but it is the participation of the faithful. It is the work of God in which we participate. It is entering into heaven.

In the

beginning of mass we all stand in the position of readiness, ready to enter into heaven. We participate in mass through words, action, singing, signs and symbols. The altar is the holiest place. It is the church's focal point. It symbolizes Jesus Christ. It is anointed with Holy Oil. When the priest reaches the altar, he kisses it as a sign of reverence for Christ, our great High Priest, Who will again make that sacrifice of His Body and Blood present to us on this altar.

We begin our common prayer with the Sign of the Cross – a physical gesture reminding us of the bodily gift of Christ on the Cross for us. The Holy mystery of

the Trinity invites us to participate. By saying 'The Lord be with you' priest gives us the greeting and blessing of God.

In the **liturgy of the word** we experience God among us and open ourselves to God's action through the word. It is also called "Anamnesis"--living memory. It is not a

fairy tale but the living and active word of God. It is our salvation history which is not only read but lived. After

two readings, first from Old Testament and second from New testament, an alleluia is sung to greet the Gospel reading. This is a Hebrew word which means is to praise the Lord. The Gospel is the fulfillment of prophecy. After the Gospel, a homily is given. It is time to meditate and contemplate.

The Eucharistic Prayer: The long prayer which follows brings us to the very center of the Mass and the heart of our faith. While the words of the prayer may vary from Sunday to Sunday, the prayer always has this structure: 1) We call upon God to remember all the wonderful saving deeds of our history. 2) We recall the central event in our history, Jesus Christ, and in particular the memorial he left us on the night before he died. We recall his passion, death and resurrection. 3) After gratefully calling to mind all the wonderful saving acts God has done for us in the past, we petition God to continue those deeds of Christ in the present: We pray that we may become one body, one spirit in Christ.

On the fourth day we went to the sports complex where we spend our day talking about the Holy Eucharist. Sister explained the importance and a brief history of te Holy Eucharist. On the other hand we also played various Games on that day and we had a BBQ Dinner.

On fifth day "Friday" Sr Anastasia talked about prayer life and she gave five basic steps, how to pray.

- 1. Put yourself in God's presence "act of faith"
- 2. Ask God "to help your prayer"
- 3. Meditate on the theme you have chosen
- 4. Apply it to your life
- 5. Make a resolution

Sister also explained how Jesus was punished and what kind of instruments were used through a power point presentation. After the session we had the Way of the Cross outside the church with great reverence. After supper all the participants did adoration for the whole night until Morning Prayer. Then we had mass.

On the sixth day, after breakfast Br Alexi SVD gave the talk about the **Liturgy of the Hours**, which is also called Divine office or "Breviary". It is a specific manifestation of the public prayer of the Roman rite of the Catholic Church. It is "the daily prayer of the Church, marking the hours of each day and sanctifying the day with prayer." The five "hours" during which you offer praise to God in this prayer are (1) Office of Readings, (2) Morning Prayer or "Lauds," (3) Daytime Prayer (divided into specific parts of the daytime), (4) Evening Prayer or "Vespers," and (5) Night Prayer or "Compline". At the end Br Alexi SVD gave his own life experience how Liturgy of the hour became the part of his life.

The fountain on City Square in Khabarovsk is refreshing on a hot day.

On Sunday, we did an evaluation of the past week. Almost all the participants liked the conference and said that it should go on every year. It was helpful to all the participants and broadened their minds to look at their own prayer life. It gave them some new perspective about Mass, Prayer, Liturgy of the Hours, Divine Mercy and



reading sacred scripture, and reciting the Rosary. The testimony of different people in the conference encouraged all to be faithful to God more and more.

The young generation is the future of our church; they bring new life in the church. I wish all the best to the participants to keep the spirit alive. I would like to thank the entire FOCUS team and all the organizers of this annual conference. I must say that it was the chance to seek the presence of God in all the universe and in oneself.

Fr Myron is completing his tour in the USA, visiting friends and family and speaking to parishioners about our mission.

Each year Fr Myron and Fr Dan include visits to some of our sister parishes to update parishioners about the mission. Becoming a sister parish to our mission allows parishioners from both the USA and Russia to cultivate a friendship and grow together in faith. Typically, sister parishes in the USA send aid to their "twin" by way of in kind donations for the children and poor or special offerings to help with financial needs.

During his September visit to Oregon, Fr Myron visited three of our long time sister parishes. St Phillip Benezi, Portland, St Joseph, Salem and St Mary's, Eugene. Fr Myron concelebrated Masses and updated parishioners on the latest from the mission. After each of the Masses, parishioners were able to meet and talk with Fr Myron and ask many questions. Volunteers at the parishes sold Russian icons and gifts sent from the mission office as fundraising events and truly became missionaries right in their own back yard.
