28th Anniversary of November 11, 1991 First Public Mass in Vladivostok

It was blistery cold with a wind on that day. I had to wear a hat and gloves during mass for the first time in my life. I didn't have a chasuble, so the alb and stole had to do. The altar was a borrowed table from a neighbor, but the site was the front steps of the Most Holy Mother of God Cathedral in Vladivostok. It currently had four floors inside and was full of documents of the state archive. The attendees were gathered by advertising on state radio and by ads in the newspaper. The religious image behind the altar was a statue of the Mystical Rose which someone had received from Germany. It was still the Soviet Union, so police looked at us from across the parking lot, but did not interfere. Some of the attendees were Catholics who had not received the sacraments in years. A photographer who was himself a Ukrainian Rite Catholic took pictures for history's sake. It was the end of religious repression in the Russian Far East.

What does the parish in Vladivostok mean to me?

Answers from parishioners.

Alexei: What does the parish mean to me? Right away I thought that it is the place where my worldview and my conception of the world changed! It is a place to meet God in the Sacrament of the Eucharist, and a place where we get to know even ourselves and to see another side of ourselves. For me the parish became a family, a support and a constant in my life.

Albert: What does the parish mean to me? The parish is part of my life where I regularly try to take active part in its activities. I'm a Caritas volunteer, often helping with the work and providing transportation. I love to talk to the priests, listen to the sermons, regularly attend mass remembering my relatives and friends who have already gone from this life, and, of course, not forgetting my own sins and prayers. I love our church, our parish, and our priests!

Lily: I first came when I heard the announcement on the radio of the group of activists of 6 or 8 people in the Fall of 1991 which became the seed of our great parish. Then our priests came, Fr Myron and Fr Daniel, well-intentioned, open, and approachable. It was a shock for me that they came from rich America to our country at the time when people lost their faith in anything good, lost their work, lost their families, and when many were hungry. The priests shared all our troubles, and gradually life became bearable, and then the miracle happened: They gave us our church

back! We experienced joy, faith, justice, and good! In 1992 we had our first baptisms when two of my grandchildren were baptized, and then my daughter, and in 2000 my husband was baptized! From the first days of the parish we began to help with charity work under the direction of Fr Myron, and when Caritas was founded my life became bound with its needs until today. The church and the parish are my life and that of my family!

Michael: Our Catholic parish is the place where I bring my soul into order and spend the years of my life. Our parish is the only place where I look at my life's path through the prism of eternal life, through the eyes of our Jesus Christ, and where I get answers about life here on earth. I have been on all the continents of the earth, and everywhere there are Catholic parishes, but every time I return to Vladivostok I come back to our parish and feel that this is the best place for my life and my soul. I was baptized by my grandmother who was a prisoner in Siberia. I say that we are so lucky to have our priests and religious who gave a second birth to our parish.

Natalia: I come to church in order to know God. God is love, life, truth, wisdom, and life. The meaning of our lives includes the establishment of interior, moral, and good union with God. But to know God and the meaning of life we can find only through prayer--grateful, repenting, requesting, and through confession and Communion. When I am in church I rest my soul and find strength to endure suffering and sicknesses, enemies, and temptations. May God's blessing be with you and in your house.

Tatyana: The Parish of the Most Holy Mother of God has always been connected to my family. My ancestors came to Vladivostok from Poland at the beginning of the 20th century. The first thing they did was to meet with the priest and become parishioners. For more than 100 years five generations of my family have been parishioners. Many unknown facts about our family have been known through the parish registry books: Our ancestors participated in the

construction of the brick church, brought their donations, prayed here, and preserved their faith during the bad times. In the years of antireligious and political repression they had to hide their relationship with the Church. For more than 60 years they kept their faith in silence in their hearts. In the 1990's our generation saw the rebirth of the church. We were among the first to come for the mass on the steps of the still-closed Catholic church. we participated in the official registration of the new parish corporation, and helped with the repair of the church building, helping to complete what our ancestors had started. My great grandmother Alexandra helped in the parish kitchen and helped with the housekeeping. My grandmother Veronica and Helen sang in the choir. My mother Yelena helped with many charitable activities and founded

the parish library. I work with the parish archive doing many historical projects, being a tour guide, and writing books about the Polish history in Vladivostok. My daughter Daria helps in the parish library. Praying for all our relatives is important to me, and working for the parish. Our gratitude to Fr Myron and Fr Daniel for the rebirth of our parish, and for faithful service to God! For me the parish is the home where we live with God.

Oksana: I would like to share what I like about the Parish in Vladivostok where Fr Myron and Fr Dan serve for many years. My husband and I attend already several years. The goodness that we see and hear in the psalms and under the music of the organ appeals to us in an understandable language with simplicity in Christ. The weekly mass in the church which our Catholic priests serve for us is a holiday for the soul. Alleluia!

Alexander: More than 27 years have passed since I came to mass for the first time in March of 1992. It was held in a rented hall in the House of the Pioneers. There were about 16 parishioners present, but as the years have gone by the number of parishioners has increased. It is hard to believe that we received our historical church back, but it had the state archive inside with three added floors! So at first we had mass on the first floor, then on the third floor, and when we took away the third floor, mass was on the second floor! Then we had mass temporarily in the parish house while the church building was renewed inside and out. The parish is for me, first of all, a community where people have a world view and values similar to mine. It helped me to get rid of the worldview of the "Soviet man" which was forced into the hearts of Soviet citizens. The parish helped me to form a solid interior spiritual world, strong Christian convictions, and a optimistic outlook on the world.

Natalia: God is everywhere, but the church is a place of his special presence and action for us. When we meet with God, with Jesus Christ, and with His mother the Virgin Mary we feel their presence especially in church. The church is also our home place, a giant home that unites people everywhere. The church is a place for saving souls, a place to escape from the cares of life with people who are there for love and peace. God and the saints always hear you there. The church never gets old, because in her is eternal life. Death is always before us, but in church we find the path to life.

The Charism of the Canons Regular of Jesus the Lord

I would like to highlight one aspect of our charism, which is a great and important gift to us: our community prayer with the people for the Lord and for His Church. For me it is always very important and very helpful to remind myself: our community praying of the Divine Office and of the Eucharist--the official prayers of the Church--are not just a requirement of our community life. They are the main reason that we exist, the main ministry that we do, the main method by which we fulfill our vocations. In some religious congregations, sometimes the members fall into the routine of thinking that community prayer is just one small part of their life, something that is necessary to do and "get done with" so that they can go out and do more important things; or something that is easier or more convenient to do together rather than separately. But for us our "choir of praise" in community is the main activity of our vocation, and we want to do it solemnly, publicly and joyfully. So we seek ways to include the people of God if possible; and we understand that it is a communal ministry, not simply a personal requirement of our day. As a community we minister to the Church and to the world by preparing/ rehearsing/singing/reciting/reading/proclaiming/ preaching/blessing according to the official rites of the Church.

This understanding of the Church's official liturgy as the main task of our order is for me a big help in organizing my day. This understanding of the liturgy as the main task of our charism also helps me to center myself and be attentive to God during the prayer time itself — to pay attention to the words my voice is saying and singing, the ancient words and expressions of our faith, the great words of repentance, forgiveness and redemption; the long-awaited words of promise of salvation; the inspired words of Scripture; God's own words that we use to speak back to Him our praise and thanksgiving and petitions.

This mystery of the Liturgy is a constant source of grace and inspiration for us canons; and doing it together as brothers for the local Church and for the Universal Church, is for me and for all of us a great privilege.

This is only one of the many aspects of our chrism, which should be learned well in novitiate, so that by continuing to meditate on this aspect our presence among the brothers in choir and at Mass and with the people becomes an ever deeper connection to the real presence of Jesus the Lord in our lives and in our work.


Opportunities
