

A Pilgrimage in Vladivostok


On June 1, 2024, the parish of the Most Holy Mother of God hosted a **pilgrimage** to places associated with the history of the parish and its political and religious repression when priests and laity died for their faith. The pilgrimage program was selected in such a way that each stopping place was connected with historical events, with our parishioners and our priests. The pastor of the parish, Fr. Daniel Maurer, C.J.D. led the pilgrimage, beginning from the Cathedral of the Most Holy Mother of God in Vladivostok.

First Station: Houses near the cathedral

Pilgrims learned about the last years of the parish's ministry, the confiscation of the cathedral which had always given Catholics strong faith and unshakable hope, and remembered the priests and parishioners who selflessly served God and the people. The pilgrims saw the parish houses where the priests had lived and the streets along which the priests had walked. After the confiscation of the parish buildings from 1926 to 1929. Bishop Slivovsky was under house arrest and occupied one small

room in the house at 9 3rd Portovaya St., and Fr. Yurkevich was forced to rent a room not far from the church at 11 Volodarsky St. They received the status of enemies of the Soviet regime and the category of "unemployed", which led to an increase in land taxes and high payments for housing and electricity. The position of Bishop Slivovsky became more and more threatening; he was very isolated and could communicate only with Fr. Yurkevich, the last pastor. In the city newspapers he was accused of being an enemy of the Soviet system.

Information from the Consul of Poland in Harbin, Kazimir Simonolevich, testifies to how the bishop lived. While in Vladivostok on September 15, 1929 on business, he asked his companion, student Voldemar Peltz, who was going to study in Harbin, to visit the bishop. The student's

report says: "Although the bishop lives in his own house, he was left with only one almost empty room where there were no signs or objects of religious worship. The appearance of the bishop was horrifying, because this respected spiritual person looked like a completely decrepit old man, dressed in civilian clothes. The bishop was frightened by this visit; he began to wave his hands and ask in a whisper that the visitor leave immediately. When the guest quietly said who he was and who sent him to find out how he could provide help, tears rolled from the bishop's eyes: "I ask you to thank the consul for his good intentions, I will pray for him and for everyone who remembers me. For my part, I will also ask only for prayer for me, because any requests for help will only worsen my already bad situation." The bishop did not say any more

escorted the guest out of the room." In July 1930, Slivovsky was literally thrown out of the city. He was taken on a simple cart to Sedanka station, which is 7 miles from the city where he was given only a simple small room. (To be continued.)

The pilgrims prayed for the priests and parishioners, receiving the blessing of Fr. Daniel: "God Almighty, we ask You to be with us on this pilgrimage. Help us to see Your hand and Your presence now and throughout our lives. Today, lead us along the path according to Your will. Through Christ our Lord."


